## SUB-COMMITTEE OF THE MARCH 2016 GRAND JURY REPORT ON THE CHARLES B. WEBSTER DETENTION CENTER

On April 19, 2016, Sub-Committee Members inspected the Charles B. Webster Detention Center.

We were greeted by Major Robert Leverett and Captain Bill Reeves.

Captain Reeves was our tour guide.

We ate lunch at the facility.

Trustee inmates assist with preparing and serving food.

Inmates are provided two hot meals – breakfast and lunch – and a bagged meal for dinner.

The entire facility is clean and organized.

The facility is equipped to house 1,056 inmates.

They currently have about 100 female and 850 male inmates.

Male and female pods were built in 1996; an additional male pod was constructed in 2010.

Inmates with medical and mental issues are kept separate from regular population.

Violent offenders wear stripped jumpsuits and non-violent solid-color jumpsuits.

Females wear pink or pink-and-white striped jumpsuits and males wear orange or orange-and-white striped jumpsuits.

The Booking Area was part of the tour and Captain Reeves explained the process.

We were shown Central Control, the security center, which monitors cameras and all gates and doors to the facility.

We saw an in-house courtroom for high-profile cases.

The inmates have access to medical and dental care. The dentist comes out twice a week to pull and fill teeth.

When an inmate needs medical attention, he/she submits a request for sick call through the kiosk machine.

When an inmate is released and does not have transportation, he/she is issued a bus ticket.

Inmates visit guests by way of video monitors.

## AUGUSTA JUDICIAL CIRCUIT ADULT FELONY DRUG COURT

The Superior Court and Accountability Court Coordinator, Elaina Ashley, visited the Grand Jury on May 3, 2016 to talk about Drug Court.

Drug Court is a two-year voluntary program.

Drug Court only allows defendants charged with drug possession to participate. They cannot have a violent past or be charged with distribution.

The program fee is \$3,600.00.

There are currently 85 active participants and the program can have up to 125 active participants.

The program has five phases which require drug treatment, drug testing, community service and/or work requirement, court sessions and AA or NA meetings.

Drug treatment is contracted out through a bid process.

If a participant is not following the program's requirements, punishment begins with community service to removal from the program.

125 defendants have graduated from the program.

75 defendants have been terminated from the program.

Drug Court has improved the lives of the participants and has lowered the odds that they will use drugs in the future. Drug Court is better than jail for rehabilitating drug users.
