SUB-COMMITTEE OF THE NOVEMBER TERM 2008 GRAND JURY REPORT ON THE RICHMOND COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT CENTER

On December 16, 2008, a group of 11 members from the November Term 2008 Richmond County Grand Jury toured the Sheriff's Department and the Law Enforcement Center (LEC). The members attending the tour are included at the end of this report.

Upon our arrival, we noticed that the infrastructure was old. The building needed to be painted and cleaned. In the lobby, the carpet was dirty and the smell was not pleasant. The information board in the lobby was too small. We were greeted by Captain Reeves, Officer in Charge.

We were escorted into a break room for an overview of the jail's history, capacity, procedures and questions. We also received a tour by Major Johnson and Captain Reeves.

The Law Enforcement Center was built in 1985 to house 354 inmates. Currently, the LEC normally averages between 440 and 450 inmates daily. The Richmond County Sheriff's Department no longer has the 50 beds for use at the Richmond County Correctional Institute on Tobacco Road. The LEC has inmates charged with simple misdemeanors up to felonies.

The cost of housing inmates last year was approximately \$4 million for medical and dental services and approximately \$1.6 million for food. The inmates eat three hot meals per day. The food that was served to us by the inmates was great. Inmates receive the proper medical, dental and psychiatric care. Their medical staff is great.

The facility is overcrowded and there is definitely a shortage of staff. Some inmates are sleeping on the floor due to overcrowding. The inmates have great privileges. They are authorized to have cable television and telephone and vending machine usage. The inmates were in great spirits when we entered the floor.

We observed that the ratio of guards per inmate was a big concern. The LEC lacks guards/personnel to run an effective and efficient operation. This shortage needs to be identified and addressed as soon as possible before a major problem occurs.

There is a shortage of space in both the men's and women's areas. The east and west wings need to be extended. The facility had water leaks in walls which has caused some areas to mold. There is need for a makeover of the Law Enforcement Center.

It should be noted that the Grand Jurors observed the enforcement officers to be overworked and underpaid. Therefore, it is the recommendation of this Sub-Committee that the major problems be addressed by approving authorities and procedures taken to increase staff pay and add space for the overcrowding.

SUB-COMMITTEE OF THE NOVEMBER TERM 2008 GRAND JURY REPORT ON THE CHARLES B. WEBSTER DETENTION CENTER

On January 13, 2009, a group of eight members from the November Term 2008 Richmond County Grand Jury toured the Charles B. Webster Detention Center on Phinizy Road in Augusta, Georgia.

Upon our arrival, we were greeted by Captain Huffman, the officer in charge. He welcomed the Sub-Committee members. Captain Huffman proceeded by telling the history of the Detention Center located on Phinizy Road. He stated that the facility was opened in November 1997 to alleviate the overcrowding of inmates at the Law Enforcement Center at 401 Walton Way. The facility opened with 552 beds. Currently with 600 inmates, the Detention Center houses only non-felony prisoners and most have short-term sentences.

It was noted that the physical condition of the Detention Center is excellent and the inmates are well treated. Inmates are fed three times a day and they receive medical and dental services as needed.

There are two major problems that the facility must contend with on a day-to-day basis. The facility is overcrowded and there is a personnel shortage. The ratio of inmates to correctional officers is 11 to one. This is a major concern with Captain Huffman.

When the Detention Center opened, the correct number of guards/personnel was not hired, but Captain Huffman was promised the personnel would be added later. The personnel headcount is written on paper, but the staff was never hired and placed within the facility. This shortage has potential for a major problem. The Detention Center is overcrowded with inmates and understaffed with guards. It was also noted that there is a tremendous shortage of space in the women's pod area.

Captain Huffman let the Grand Jurors know that there are future plans to expand the Detention Center. It is the recommendation of the Sub-Committee that the two major problems found at the facility be addressed by approving authorities and procedures taken to increase the staff and add space for the overcrowded inmates.
